The Flesch–Kincaid readability tests are readability tests designed to indicate how difficult a passage in English is to understand. There are two tests, the Flesch Reading Ease Test, and the Flesch–Kincaid Grade Level Test. Although they use the same core measures (word length and sentence length), they have different weighting factors. Rudolf Flesch devised the Reading Ease Evaluation; somewhat later, he and J. Peter Kincaid developed the Grade Level evaluation for the United States Navy. This method was first used by the Army for assessing the difficulty of technical manuals in 1978 and soon after became a United States Military Standard. Pennsylvania was the first U.S. state to require that automobile insurance policies be written at no higher than a ninth-grade level of reading difficulty. This is now a common requirement in many other states and for other legal documents such as insurance policies. Scientists have calculated the Flesch score for the seven Harry Potter books. The average Flesch score for Harry Potter was 72.83, with the highest score (81.32) for Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone and the lowest score (65.88) for Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix.
